
Welcome to VOICES, the Volunteer English Program Student Magazine

Differences between America and Japan

Last September I left Tokyo, Japan, with mixed feelings of anxiety and anticipation. Now I am here, one year out of Tokyo to the suburbs of Philadelphia (Philly!!)

There are many cultural differences between America and Japan. Here are my impressions!

I. American Personality

American people seem very extroverted. They start talking in a friendly way even to strangers! It is common to exchange greetings or say a word about the weather to everyone they meet. They hold doors for each other and say thank you. It feels polite and friendly.
